### **OPIOID OVERDOSE BASICS**

Prescription opioids (hydrocodone, oxycodone, and morphine) and illegal opioids (heroin and illegally made fentanyl) are powerful drugs that have a risk of a potentially fatal overdose. Anyone who uses opioids can experience an overdose, but certain factors may increase risk including but not limited to:

- ✓ Combining opioids with alcohol or certain other drugs.
- ✓ Taking high daily dosages of prescription opioids.
- ✓ Taking more opioids than prescribed.
- Taking illegal DRUGS, like heroin or manufactured fentanyl, that could possibly contain unknown or harmful substances.
- Certain medical conditions, such as sleep apnea, or reduced kidney or liver function.
- ✓ Age greater than 65 years old.
