
Protocol Assessment Community Excellence and Environmental Health (PACE-EH)

Progress Report: Survey Results



- 1) Children with special needs (11.1%)
 - No adequate equipment at playgrounds for special needs children (68.9%)
- 2) Community issues: Crime (67.2%), Community Appearance (51.1%), Household water quality (45.9%)
- 3) Buildings that need to be demolished (56.5%), Abandoned cars to be removed (46.0%)
- 4) Community not well lite at night (56.7%)
- 5) Neighborhood issues
 - a. No recreation community center (48.6%)
 - b. No Parks or playgrounds (55.6%)
 - c. No sidewalks or walking/biking paths (33.6%)

- 6) Bike racks needed
 - a. Grocery stores
 - b. Convenience store
 - c. Parks
 - d. Bus Stops
- 7) Houses that don't have carbon monoxide detectors (58.8%)
- 8) Increase in physical activity contributing factors:
 - a. Construction of sidewalks (69.2%)
 - b. Decrease in crime (61.9%)
- 9) Activities in neighborhoods would increase if even surfaces (68.7%)
- 10) Roaming animals (66.8%) and mosquitos concern (54.9%)

Progress Report

- 1) Commissioner Kathryn Starkey hosted a curbside pickup community clean-up in the Buena Vista area in Holiday on September 10, 2022, with removal of 36 tons of waste. In addition, September 9th, 2022, residents were offered to bring waste to the Pasco County Solid Waste Citizen's Drop Off at no charge.
- 2) To better serve the community Code enforcement starting in September 2022 will be available Tuesdays and Thursdays 11:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. and in operation during the weekends.
- 3) WMAC (West Market Action Committee) along with the Department of Health of Pasco County is seeking out grocery stores, convenient stores, bus stops and park to add bike racks and bike fix stations.
- 4) The Department of Health in Pasco County along with stakeholders is in the process of creating a playground in Aloha Gardens Park.
- 5) Pasco County's Community Development mission is "Improving the lives of Pasco's citizens through homeless initiatives, neighborhood revitalization, affordable housing and community partnerships using state and federal funding".
- 6) August 2022, Pasco County was awarded a little over a million dollars (\$1,040,000) from Department of Health in Tallahassee, to assist partners on a local level approach to combat the opioid overdose epidemic.
- 7) Pasco County Keep Pasco Beautiful hosted a great American cleanup on March 4th, 2023
